The main cities like Seville, Madrid, Barcelona, Alicante, Malaga, and Valencia have international airports, which get [flights](#) from UK. The Iberia is the national airline, although all the chief charter airlines as well as the budget airlines operate flights to this place too. Ryanair also operates flights from UK, to 15 diverse airports in Spain.

Madrid is the capital and largest city of Spain and is located in the centre of the country, surrounded by mountains. The majority of the [travel](#) attractions are situated in the historical centre. Here you will find medieval architecture, cathedrals and churches combined with a cosmopolitan mixture of shops and a buzzing night life.

Tourists seeking museums and the art museums must see Museo del Prado, as well as the National Archaeology Museum. The Palacio Real also known as Royal Palace is a gigantic and attractive structure, that shouldn't be missed and also the Plaza Mayor, which is again an arresting square, in Madrid.

Madrid has a continental climate – warm and wet summers and colder winters with snow being a possibility.

Barajas International Airport receives all the flights from UK to Madrid. The airport is located nearly 15 -20 minutes from Madrid and is easily reachable.

Barcelona is the second largest city in Spain, positioned on Mediterranean coast. It is a lively city, and is a sought after tourist destination, for years. The blend of historic and contemporary attracts many tourists. The main attractions are Ciutat Vella, the old town, and Eixample, which is the modernist area, popular for art nouveau architecture.

The weather experienced here is Mediterranean, therefore warm temperatures, throughout year. It has hot and dry summers, and mild temperatures with rainfall throughout the winter.

To get to Barcelona, take a flight to International Airport, also called El Prat, located just rough 6 miles from Barcelona.

Other popular city destinations include Valencia on the Mediterranean coast, where paella was invented; Alicante, to the south of Valencia; Bilbao, in the north; Cadiz, the oldest city in Western Europe; and Seville, where you'll find the world's third largest cathedral.

Spain is perhaps most well known for its countless Mediterranean coastal resorts and miles of sandy beaches.

The Costa del Sol is the most famous among these. It means 'sun coast'. The region spans for about 100 miles, and comprise Malaga. To get to this part of Spain, you must fly to Malaga International Airport, as there are plenty of carriers, and much competition at this route, and you may get some cheap and affordable tickets.

Further east in the province of Granada you can relax on some slightly less crowded beaches or go skiing in the Sierra Nevada in the winter! Flights from the UK are available directly to Granada Airport, or fly further east into Almeria Airport where direct flights from the UK are also available.

Almeria is one of the most unspoilt sections of coastline, where tourists can find some great beach resorts, national parks, mountains, and desert. It is a better option to Costa del Sol.

The southern as well as the eastern coastline enjoy a Mediterranean type of climate, therefore it a fine place to visit throughout the year, although mainly the summer months are better for a beach retreat.
